

Services in Norfolk and Palestine for 'Father John'

Derek James looks at the life and work of Rev John Aves, and why so many will celebrate his legacy on the 20th anniversary of his death

ervices of remembrance will be held in Norwich, Attleborough, Besthorpe and Palestine to mark the 20th anniversary of the death of "Father John."

Since the Rev John Aves died in Bethlehem while working at the Dheisheh Refugee Camp more than £500,000 has been raised in his memory to give 80 young women and men an education at Al-Quds university and hope for a future.

An extraordinary achievement which has been made possible by the people of Norfolk and Suffolk supporting the John Aves Education Project (JAEP) established by his wife Anne and sons Ben and Edmund following his death in January 2004 at the age of 52.

Today the project is run by Anne, Liz Magem and Samia Tabari and the work they do is more important than ever as the war between Israel and Hamas continues to cause heart-breaking death and destruction.

Currently there are no tourists or pilgrims visiting the Holy Land which impacts on the employment of Palestinians in Bethlehem and East Jerusalem.

All work in Israel by
Palestinians has been stopped,
many people are not being paid,
debts are mounting and while
students can graduate they
cannot receive certificates or seek
work until debts are paid.

Economic life has been paralysed and this has led to widespread poverty so the memory of Father John and the continuing good work of JAEP is more important than ever.

"Amid these difficult circumstances, we will not forget our friend John, who taught us the art of giving and loving people regardless of their colour, religion, or nationally," say the Ibdaa community at Dheisheh Palestinian Refugee Camp.

"John taught us that absence is not the end, and that giving transcends physical presence. Through his giving and your commitment to our youth John remains present among us.

"Therefore, on January 25, we will hold a special day dedicated to John under the title 'John: Continuous Giving Despite Departure.'

"This event will include a lecture with creative youth where we will speak about John's life, his philanthropy, and your role in educating the youth of Palestine, accompanied by a photo presentation," say the partners.

The impact John had in Palestine was so strong that when Anne, Ben and Edmund visited the country following his death they were welcomed by the 1st President of the Palestinian National Authority, Yasser Arafat. He awarded Anne a posthumous medal for John's services to peace.

There will be four church services in Norfolk where Canon Dr John Aves, the son of a Suffolk farmer, served which we are all welcome to attend.


Sunday January 28 at 5pm. Evensong at St Peter Mancroft, Norwich, Anne Aves will speak during the service which will be followed by middle eastern light refreshments from the JAEP team. This is the nearest Sunday to the anniversary of John's death on January 25 2004.

Sunday February 4 at 10.30am, Mass at St Giles Church, Norwich. Anne will speak during the service. John's body was brought into St Giles on February 5, 2004. He was Priest in Charge from September 1999 until his death.

Tuesday February 6, at 5.30pm, Evensong at Norwich Cathedral. The Dean, the Very Revd Dr Andrew Braddock will preach and The Precentor, Canon Aidan Platten will lead the intercessions. Both knew John well. His funeral was held here on February 6, 2004. The service will be followed by refreshments.

Sunday March 17, at 10am, St Mary's Church, Attleborough, followed by one at All Saints, Besthorpe, at 11.30am. Anne will speak during the service. A memorial service was held on FEATURE
